What is prayer?

Most people would probably agree that in layman's terms, prayer is simply talking with God. A formal definition I found online is: "A solemn request for help or expression of thanks addressed to God or an object of worship."

The Bible tells us we should pray without ceasing (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18), so it follows that God wants us to talk with Him on a regular basis. But how do we do this? Many of us probably learned this prayer when we were little:

Now I lay me down to sleep
I pray the Lord my soul to keep.
If I should die before I wake,
I pray the Lord my soul to take.

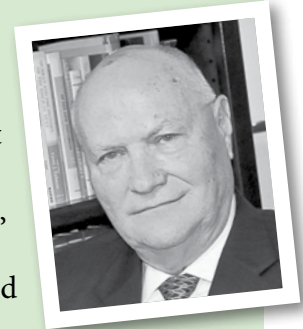
At the end, you might also ask God to bless members of your family or ask for help on something. The prayer above is more of an opening to get you going, but if you can't think of anything else to say, it can also stand on its own. It works great for children because it rhymes, and it is pretty easy to remember. It can work for adults too if you don't know how to get started, but I'd like to lay out the components of a basic prayer for adults and then give an example that can be used. It's very simple:

1. The opening
2. Asking for forgiveness
3. Giving thanks
4. The ending

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The Season for Giving

Someone told me the other day that Christmas is the season for giving. Whereas I have heard that said before, I asked the person what "The Season for Giving" meant. She said, "Oh, you know, it means giving presents, giving to support good causes like the Salvation Army, and 'stuff' like that." I wasn't satisfied with her response; I thought through the phrase and came up with several definitions for "The Season for Giving."



At the top of the list is the gift that tops all gifts: God's gift of Jesus Christ. His giving is captured in the most famous verse in the Bible, "For God so loved the world that He gave..." (John 3:16). God gave that we might find forgiveness of our sins and have life eternal through Jesus Christ. It was for him a

costly gift; his Son was executed by mean-spirited men who never learned the meaning of selfless giving. Life was all about them and preserving their prejudices. They have many relatives in America today.

The Season for Giving means we stretch ourselves and provide resources for hurting people. Look around you; you will see these people. I'm not thinking about the man who stands at the corner of a busy intersection holding a sign asking for help. Instead, I'm thinking about little children who do not have enough food each day, old people whose financial resources are gone and whose families have cast them aside, the young woman who works three jobs to support her children. Money, food, clothing are good gifts for these people. But our material gifts must not be a substitute for human compassion, the kind of compassion that embraces these people with love and with commitment to help them in their future. These people don't need help only at Christmas; many of them need help every day. A lady dying with cancer called me one day around Christmas time and asked if I knew of some families with children who could not celebrate Christmas because they did not have the means. I gave her some suggestions and she called me several days later to tell me about her gifts for a specific family. There were audible sobs in her voice as she said that giving to them was the greatest joy she felt at Christmas. She passed on a few days later. The gifts of love from a dying woman impressed upon me the marvelous story

of Christmas. Don't forget to take a request from the Christmas tree in the vestibule and fulfill it; you will help a family celebrate Christmas.

The Season for Giving is about Christians telling the story of God's love and inviting the lost to come to Christ. Witnessing for Christ can be challenging for a Christian. Some Christians find it very intimidating to share their faith with people who do not know Christ. I have a solution for that problem: the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. You can help missionaries serving through the International Mission Board as they offer their witness for Jesus Christ often in foreign fields where the Good News of Jesus Christ has not been shared with them. You bear witness to Christ through your gift. One of the first things I learned in the Baptist church was our commitment to missions. Lottie Moon was a missionary in China for forty years. She was coming back home when she died aboard a ship in the harbor of Kobe, Japan. The story of this little woman, she was a little over four feet tall, has inspired the giving of millions of dollars for the work of foreign missions through Southern Baptists. Every dollar given goes directly to help missionaries on the field. We have envelopes you can use for your "Lottie" gift; another sign of the "Season for Giving."

I could list other ways to give at Christmas that truly make Christmas the "Season for Giving." These are suggestions; grasp one of them and make Christmas the "Season for Giving." Giving is transformative. It transforms the lives of those to whom we give. A dark and desperate situation may be changed by our giving and lives are transformed by the transformative power of God's love at work through us. In addition, giving transforms the life of the one giving. We become better people through our generosity. A heart filled with generosity does not have room for anxiety and depression. Yes, this is the Season for Giving. We give to help other people, but in the process, we are also transforming our lives.
