Prayer continued ...

DeStefano's prayer asking God to make us an instrument of his mission and purpose. St. Francis wrote a prayer in the twelfth century which is familiar to many of us. It begins with the line, "Lord, make me an instrument of your peace." This is a prayer that God will answer. Why?

God works through us. God does not manifest himself in a physical presence nor does he alter the natural events of his creation to reveal himself. He reveals himself most profoundly through us as we become instruments of his will. There are many examples of this in the Bible such as God's calling Moses to lead the captives from Egypt, God's instructing Samuel to anoint David as King and even Jesus committing his work to an ordinary and fully human band of followers. God does his work through us.

One morning I received a telephone call from a person in deep distress. I did not know him. He called the church where I was serving at that time because someone had sent him information about the church and invited him to be his guest. He found the brochure in a stack of old mail. At the moment of his great need he found the name and phone number of a church he could call for help. That was not a coincidence. Someone in the church

sent a note in which he shared information about the church. God used the effort of that person as an instrument of his mission and purpose.

Pray this prayer asking God to make you his instrument and see what happens. Don't pray the prayer without sincerity and be ready for action because God will send someone into your life who needs help. Offer the prayer; expect God to use you and then tell me about how he used you.

The host of the radio program on which the prophecy was made and promoted offered a revisionist view on May 22, the day after judgment was supposed to come. He said that there was a “silent judgment” on May 21. God began judgment silently on May 21 and would bring it to its conclusion with the end of the world on October 21. This is now several years after the original prophecy and we are still here.

The prophet did get one thing right: a silent judgment occurs every day of our lives. As Christians, we are daily judged by our actions. We are known to a lost world by what we do and not by what we say. Edgar Guest said, “I’d rather see a sermon than hear one any day.” Each day the Christian is confronted with a litany of choices and the way he responds to each one passes judgment on his convictions and his obedience to Jesus Christ. We all preach a sermon with our lives every day.

I’m old enough to remember the days when you could drive into a service station, that’s what they were called in those days, and an attendant would put gas in your car for you. When I was a student preacher, I purchased gas at a service station near the church I served. I had invited the attendant to church, but he never came. One Saturday when I paid, he gave me more change than he should have. I caught his mistake

as I got into the car. I went back to him and pointed out the mistake. He smiled and said, “I was just testing you to see if you’re what you say you are. If you hadn’t come back, I would’ve wondered about your Christianity.” I was judged that day and had I not been attentive, I could have failed the test.
