The Future of the Church

I took some time off over the holidays. (That really is a misstatement because ministers are never “off” the clock). I spent some time reading articles I had collected over the past year on the future of the church. A question ran through the articles: “Does the church, not just Falls but what we call the Church Universal, have a promising future or is it, like many other institutions, dying a slow death?” Let me share with you some gleanings from my reading.

1. The church will not die. The church belongs to Jesus Christ. Christ told Simon Peter in Peter’s famous confessional scene found in Matthew 16 that the gates of hell will not prevail against his church. This is reassuring and it suggests to me the church still has great potential.

2. Although the Church of Jesus Christ will survive, many individual churches will not. Thousands of churches close their doors each year. In a recent year, 3,700 churches closed.

3. Some churches survive, and even grow, by learning new ways to minister in their context. For example, the pandemic taught the importance of churches using digital technology. Many churches are streaming services rather than gathering in buildings.

4. Congregations will continue to grow older. For some churches, the days of children running up and down the aisles are over.

5. We must plan for having fewer people in attendance after the pandemic has stabilized and the number of cases diminishes.


The Gift of a New Year

By the time you read these words we will be walking in the days of a new year, 2021. No one should be surprised.

The earth revolves around the sun and when it completes its journey another year has passed.

When, as children, we played the game of “Hide-and-Seek,” we would begin the search for our quarry by saying, “Ready or not, here I come.” Ready or not, the New Year is here.

You have a choice here: you can walk into the New Year as though you have a grudge against it. You did not accomplish all you intended to do in 2020 and now another year is here. 6. The decline in attendance will affect the offering plate. Fewer people attending church services means less money for the church budget.

7. Many churches will not have the resources to invest in long-term mission projects. Resources, including people resources, will diminish.

8. After the pandemic, healthy members of the Silent Generation, people born between 1928 and 1945, and Baby Boomers, people born between 1946 and 1974 will be the largest groups attending traditional churches, like Falls.

Here are some implications of these thoughts for Falls Baptist Church:

1. The reluctance for people to gather in groups will continue even after the pandemic recedes. This

means we need to strengthen our digital footprint. We have made a good start here.

2. Being small does not mean we are ineffective. Let us never use our size as an excuse for not fulfilling the purpose God places before us.

3. Mission projects must be short-term and clearly focused. Rather than on-going mission projects which require enormous blocks of time by volunteers, we must plan projects which can be done over a weekend or in one day.

4. We are an aging congregation with limited resources for children. This does not mean we do not want children to attend our church, bring them on! However, we must not think we are failing unless we are reaching families with children. Older people need Christ and the fellowship offered by a church family. We are good at that.

In summary, God still has a plan for Falls Baptist Church. We may be small, but we are not dying. Do not compare our effectiveness as a church with other churches; let us purpose to be the church God calls us to be and be satisfied with that.



Worship Precautions During January

The church is taking several precautions to make attendance as safe as possible during this Covid-19 pandemic. Even though we are not aware of anyone in our congregation who has the virus, we are aware you could have the virus and be without symptoms. Therefore, we are requesting that all follow these guidelines:

1. If you are ill, please do not attend until all your symptoms have disappeared.
2. Maintain six-foot social distance except for family members living in the same household.
3. Use furnished hand sanitizer or wipes as you enter the church.
4. Pew Bibles and hymnals have been removed. Order of service and hymns will appear in your individual program bulletin.
5. Use your own face mask if you desire or disposal masks will be available for those wishing to use them.
6. Pews will be cleaned before and after each service.
7. Boxes to receive tithes and offerings are placed at the doors so we do not have to handle offering plates.

Some members fall into the category of having underlying conditions which make them uncomfortable to be in groups. We understand they may not be willing to attend now. Hopefully, this pandemic will soon pass and we can truly get back to normal worship services. During the month of January Wednesday Bible study will continue on Zoom.


parents' love for Jesus Christ.
