The Cross and the Flag



Several years ago, when my oldest grandson, Wade, was just moving into adolescence we joined my son, Tommy, in New York City where Tommy lived. One hot July morning we were on Liberty Island in New York's harbor looking at the Statue of Liberty and a large flag flying on a tall pole nearby. The two most beloved symbols of American freedom, the flag and the Statue of Liberty, were captured in the same moment on that morning. Not far from the Statue of Liberty is Ellis Island where twelve million immigrants saw their first view of America. The statue and the flag brought many of them to tears. They were the people Emma Lazarus referred to in her poem that became part of the statue:

and the largest British armada ever assembled was just outside New York harbor.

- Affixing your name to the document meant that you pledged your life, your fortune, and your sacred honor to the cause of freedom
- Yet there were members of the Second Continental Congress who did not sign the Declaration of Independence.
- Non-signers included John Dickinson, who clung to the idea of reconciliation with Britain,
- Robert R. Livingston, who thought the Declaration was premature.
- On July 4, 1776, 56 representatives from all 13 colonies signed the Declaration of Independence.
- The 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence included two future presidents, three vice presidents, and ten members of the United States Congress

The Cost of Freedom

A. The writers of the declaration separated themselves from their own past.

— Jesus was separated from God on the cross (Matthew 27:46).

B. The writers of the declaration literally gave their lives.

— Jesus gave His life for mankind

How did the Patriots win “The Revolutionary War?”

1. The Colonists were fighting for their homes. They had the will to fight unlike the British soldiers and other soldiers hired by the British who were just fighting for the money they were being paid.

— Britain had underestimated their opponent and they finally came to that realization.

2. They had a home advantage by having the war in America, a place they knew and were able to get around easily.

3. French and Spanish helped by becoming allies with the colonists and helping them pay for the supplies they needed

Cross continued ...

Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.

Last week in Vacation Bible School we began each evening with a brief service that included pledging allegiance to the United States Flag, the Christian Flag and the Bible. One evening during the pledges, I thought about the big flag I saw by the Statue of Liberty and about the “huddled masses” making their way to this country to escape injustice, tyranny, lack of opportunity and embrace freedom and the American way of life. Each time we see the flag, we should remember the price many people paid for our freedom. The most solemn moment during the funeral service for a veteran is when the flag which has draped the coffin is properly folded and given to a family member. I’ve watched that scene dozens of times and it still brings tears to my eyes.

For Christians, another great symbol deserves our most reverent devotion: the cross of Jesus Christ. The flag may stand for national freedom; the cross stands for eternal freedom. On a cross outside the walls of old Jerusalem, Jesus Christ died. Paul held up the cross in his preaching and writing as the supreme icon for Christianity. It’s a long distance from Liberty Island to the city of Jerusalem, but when I talk about freedom,



my mind naturally takes in that landscape, too. Somewhere near the old city of Jerusalem, Christ was crucified. Paul made numerous references to the cross. Paul understood true freedom is available only through the cross: *It is for freedom that Christ has set us free (Gal 5:1)*. It is important for us to honor the flag and revere that which it represents. The cross, however, carries it with the weight of eternity for through what it represents, the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ, his burial and resurrection, we gain eternal freedom.
