Let's Make November "Prayer Month"

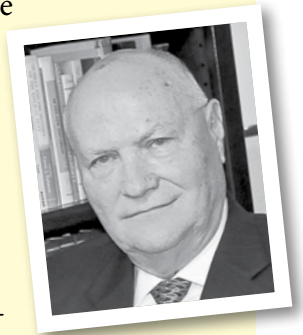

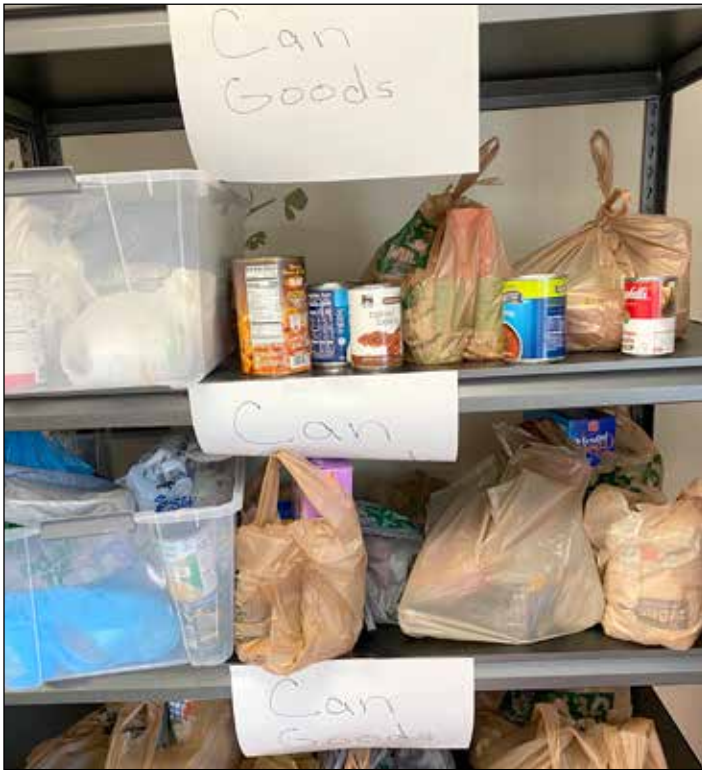
From Fonville to the Ends of the Earth

We have just completed assembling Hygiene Kits for the carnival workers at the NC State Fair. Mike Harris delivered them to the office of the Raleigh Baptist Association this week. Through that simple gift, we impact lives with the good news of the Gospel through a tangible gift. We do this because we love the Lord. Some of the workers come from far away places. You will see among them ethnics whose origins are in foreign countries. For some of them hygiene kits represent luxuries. From Fonville to the ends of the earth.

We recently gave 150 pounds of food to the Tri Area Ministry Food Pantry in Wake Forest. Every week food insecure people make their way to TAMFP on Holding Avenue in Wake Forest for food. Last year TAMFP provided food for 10,609 families and distributed 795,000 pounds of food. Even in our affluent county, you can still count 160,000 food insecure people. Almost 60,000 of them are children. From Fonville to the ends of the earth.

We support the work of Baptist On Mission disaster relief work through Baptist Men. The work of disaster relief is never over. Disaster relief teams are still working in the eastern part of our state for rebuilds due to Florence — that's right, they are still working to help people recover from Florence even though the storm occurred in September 2018. They estimate they will continue that work for at least two more years as 90,000 homes were destroyed or severely damaged by Florence. Through your gifts to the work of Baptist Men, also known as Baptist On Mission, you are helping people rebuild their lives. From Fonville to the ends of the earth.

Next month, November, we will be collecting money for the work of our Baptist Children's Homes.

Dr. Michael Blackwell, BCH President/CEO, recently wrote about a girl named Samantha. She lives at the Odum Home in Pembroke. There, she accepted Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. Blackwell says Samantha heard the Gospel and accepted Christ "because churches like yours, through the Annual Offering, gave her a caring, Christian home at Baptist Children's Homes." Through the BCH annual offering, 195,000 children, families and adults were served in 2020. Blackwell says, "Through your Annual Offering, the light of Christ shines into a North Carolina mission field in need of hope!" From Fonville to the ends of the earth.

In December we will promote the Lottie Moon offering for Foreign Missions. Through this single offering Southern Baptists have given more than five-billion dollars to International Missions. As a result of last year's offering more than 144,000 people became believers in Christ, and 18,000 new churches were started. A newcomer to Baptist life asked, "When will we get Lottie Moon paid off," as though it represented a church debt. My answer was, we will never pay it off because the work of missions will continue until Christ returns. From Fonville to the ends of the earth.

I am proud to be a part of this church which takes missions seriously. We, however, must not rest on our past achievements; the need of sharing Christ will always be pressing upon us. The work never stops. From Fonville to the ends of the earth.
