It's not the construction project which keeps people from church on Sundays. So, what is it? Spiritual apathy? All of us have a dose of that from time-to-time. We feed our bodies but often neglect our spiritual side. We fare well physically but may be emaciated spiritually. You've gotten out of the habit? I learned a long time ago people get "out of the habit" of attending church if they miss three consecutive Sundays. That's all it takes. Miss one Sunday without a legitimate reason, illness, family issues, etc., no big problem. Miss three Sundays consecutively and church attendance is in the rearview mirror. Don't attend because there are hypocrites in church? I've heard that many times. As my dad said, "I would rather be in church with a few hypocrites than spend eternity in hell with all of them." Maybe the pews are too hard. No problem: we'll give you a cushion. Too cold in the sanctuary? No problem: we have blankets. You don't like the hymns we sing? Tell us something you like.

I could continue listing excuses for not coming to church. I'm not being critical of legitimate reasons for not attending such as health or family problems. As I write these words, I am remembering several people who used to attend faithfully who are in poor health and can no longer attend. I grieve with them over their wanting to attend but not being able to. My concern is for the people who could attend and choose not to.

I could list many things you are missing by not attending. We were discussing people on our prayer list on Wednesday night. The room was filled with love and concern for those on our prayer list and we prayed for them and grieve they are no longer able to join us. By not attending you miss the love for each other which circles the fellowship hall on Wednesday nights and hovers among the stained-glass windows on Sunday mornings. You miss hearing your name called by friends who love you. You miss the chance of experiencing the overwhelming presence of the Lord among his people as they gather to worship him. Furthermore, we miss you.

Next Sunday I pray you will wake with the vision of Christ and his church on your heart and that, unless providentially prevented, you will come back home to Falls. Your spiritual family is waiting for you.
